FRANK PORTERFIELD PASSES AWAY UNEXPECTEDLY AT HIS HOME.

A Gallant Confederate Soldier, Who Served Throughout War With Distinction.

The death of Mr. Frank Porterfield occurred at his home on West End avenue yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

The announcement of the death of Mr. Porterfield was a great surprise and shock to his many friends in this city, where he has spent his life and where he was respected as a man of many noble qualities, both of heart and mind.

He had a severe attack of grlp a few months ago, and since then had suffered more or less all the time, but was able to attend to the duties of his office. Yester-day he came down town, but returned home at noon and did not come back to his office, as he was not feeling well, and at 4:30 o'clock he was suddenly seized with a pain in his heart, and expired before medical aid could be secured.

He was born and reared in Nashville, and when the civil war broke out enlisted In Company B, Rock City Guards, and was mustered into the Confederate service with his company on May 10, 4861, as a part of Maney's First Tennessee Regiment. part of Maney's First Tennessee Regiment. His regiment went to Virginia and was under Gen. Robert E. Lee during the Cheat Moustain campaign; then with Loring, and finally with Stonewall Jackson. The regiment spent the winter near Winchester, Va., and in the spring was transferred to the Western army just in time to participate in the battle of Shiloh. The regiment went to Tupelo, Miss., and Mr. Porterfield was detached and detailed to staff duty on Gen. B. F. Cheatham's staff. He served in this capacity throughout the war, and his comrades say of him there was never a more gallant soldier than he, nor a man efficient more in the capacity he filled, doing in fact the actual duties of the Adjutant-General.


After the war he returned to Nashville and began keeping books for Mr. Douglas, and after that he was connected with various business enterprises. He was aesthetic in his tastes, a great lover of flowers, and his skill with flowers was something remarkable. He was open-hearted and genial, and was held in high regard.

Mr. Porterfield had been married twice, his first wife being Miss Castleman, and his second, who survives him, Miss Suste Houston. By his first wife he left three daughters, Mrs. Leland Rankin of Richmond, Va. Mrs. Horace Kercheval and Mrs. B. Kirk Rankin of this city.

The death of Mr. Porterfield was peculfarly a sad one, coming as it did on the day following the marriage of his youngest daughter to Mr. B. Kirk Rankin.
